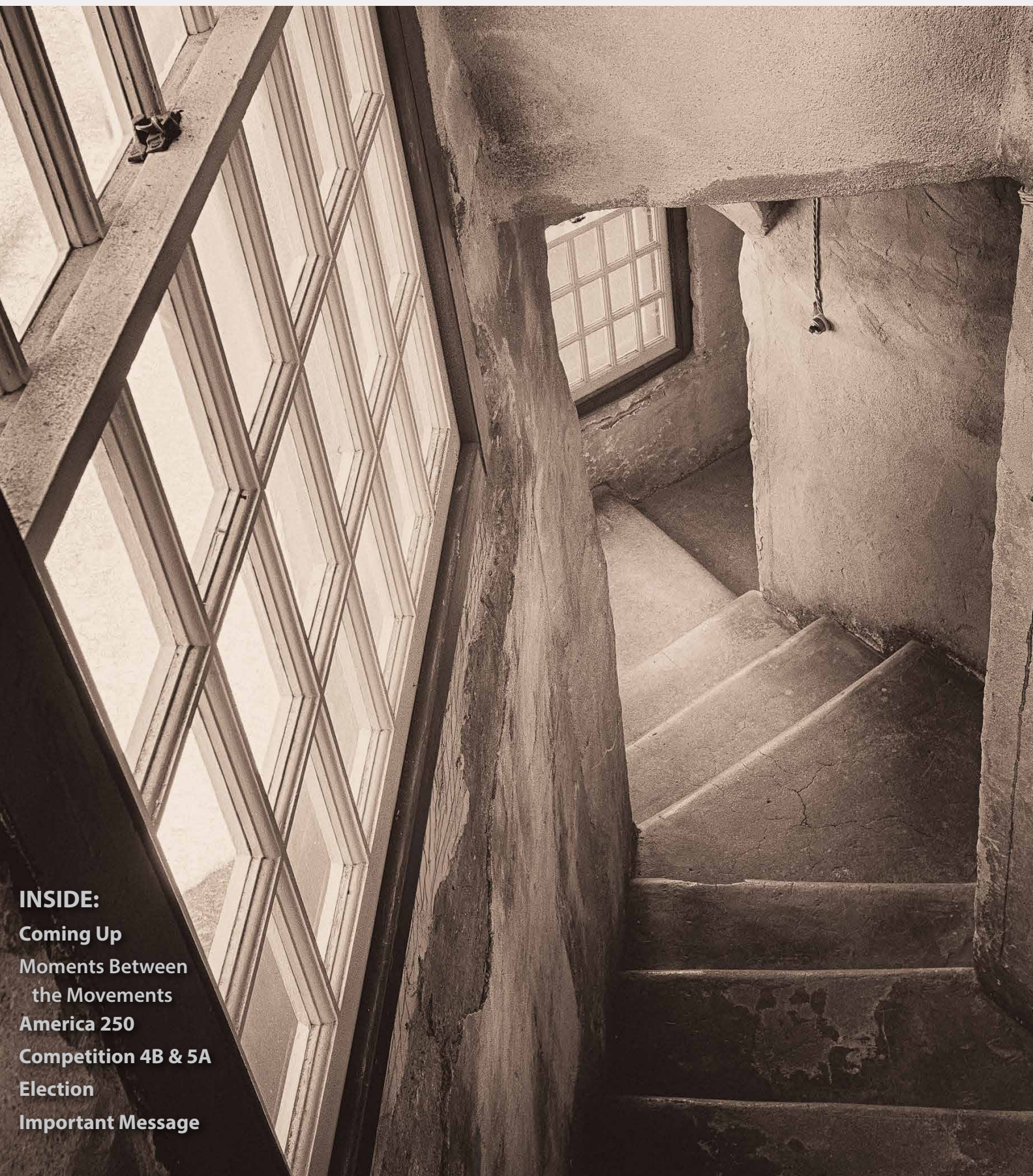

Bylaws

When the WPS board, in consultation with the membership, made the decision to move our meetings from Friday nights to Tuesday nights, we determined that in order to make this decision take effect we would also need to amend our bylaws. As Leon has mentioned in a message from the board to the membership (see [page 24](#) in this issue) our bylaws were adopted almost fifty years ago, and at that time various club operational practices were overly specified in the bylaws and don't necessarily meet our current needs and practices. For example, regular meetings were assumed to be in person on Fridays with various deadlines for notifications, annual meeting dates, etc. specified as being on specific Friday offsets (last Friday of April, first Friday in March, etc.). The bylaws also state that meetings occur at the Westchester Community College in Valhalla. The board therefore decided to amend the bylaws to make them more generic and allow greater flexibility in scheduling, holding online meetings, etc., without needing to amend the bylaws each time. Amendments also correct minor errors and make simplifications to better align with our practices. We will capture procedures, policies, and guidelines in a separate document that the board will manage as part of their regular responsibilities, as empowered by the bylaws.

The amendments were drafted by a committee chaired by Leon Zelazny, with contributions from Paul Moulton and myself. At our March 19 meeting, the full WPS board unanimously voted to bring these changes to the Annual Membership Meeting on April 24th for ratification by the membership. I would like to thank Leon and Paul for their many hours of work in preparing these bylaws and amendments.

Please plan on attending this meeting, as we need a quorum to conduct business and your vote to ratify the bylaws. As usual we will also hold our board elections (see the list of nominees on pages [22 and 23](#)) and board members will present reports of their activities.

In March, we had a wonderful exhibition at the Ossining Public Library, curated by Paul Moulton. I created a slideshow [video](#) of the photos there and uploaded it to our brand new Westchester Photographic Society [YouTube channel](#). Please "like" and comment on the video, and subscribe to our channel as this helps the YouTube algorithm decide who to suggest our video to. We hope to post exhibition videos and other public content in the future to increase online awareness of our club.

And speaking of YouTube, I learned something new about ISO in this short YouTube video:

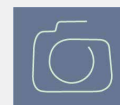

Janice Koskey on May 15

Contemplating Our Photography:
Looking Behind the Image

Topic

Janice Koskey takes us through a kaleidoscopic array of all aspects of art, from visual elements through meaning and aesthetics to the poetry or universal truth of our work.

Groundbreaking image makers and photo philosophers from Alfred Stieglitz, Ansel Adams and Minor White, to more contemporary photo commentators, Paul and John Paul Caponigro and Cig Harvey, speak of the ways in which our photographs are a reflection of our inner selves and our unique view of the world. Contemplating the intention, emotion, and figurative language of our work can give us the insight to understand more deeply what we are attempting to convey to our viewers and essentially who we are as photographers.

Sift out your favorite photographs, those you consider as your finest art, bring them in your mind or on paper to this webinar, and we will go through the thinking process it may take to gain a deeper understanding of your own creations.

Bio

Janice Koskey relaxes into her life as a photographer after a long career with the Lynn, MA, Public Schools, teaching students and teachers the joys of writing and literature. Early in her career she used analog photography as a teaching tool, developing candid portraits and photographing projects to raise students' self-esteem, essential to learning. Feeling at home with a camera, embracing digital photography in retirement, was a natural progression for Janice. She grew in skill under the guidance of the fine folks at the Greater Lynn Photographic Association and soon was taking groups to art museums and photography exhibits and convening what she called an "Artistic Vision" class where members contemplated and discussed their work together. All manner of photography has fascinated Janice: nature, landscape, street, composite, and abstract. She travels extensively and takes her camera with her.

Recently Janice has combined her skills of writing and literary analysis with a smattering of psychology, art history, and aesthetics to develop lectures and workshops on contemplative photography. Ms. Koskey helps artists look behind and beyond their images to the metaphor and meaning they bring to the viewer and the photographer as well. Janice has published articles on this contemplative approach in the PSA journal and written tips for photographers in the PSA travel division online. In 2024 her photographs were part of an exhibit at the Griffin Museum of Photography and included in a review in the Boston Globe. Janice regularly exhibits her work and has won multiple awards at local and international shows. Her heartfelt photographs have found their way into comfortable homes near and far.

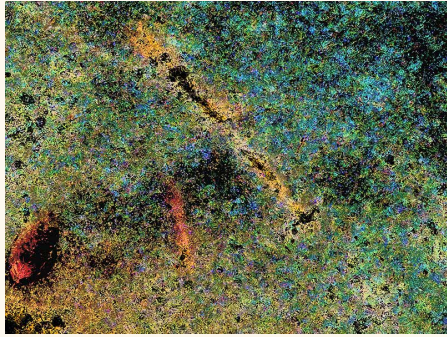

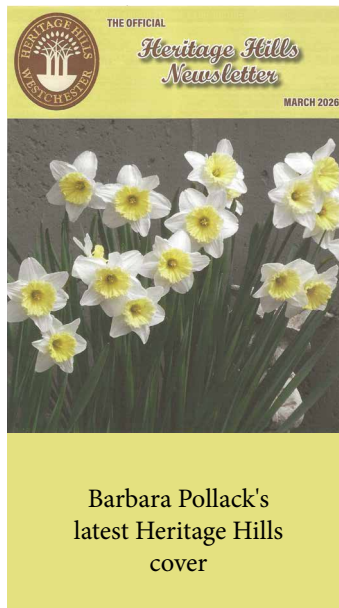
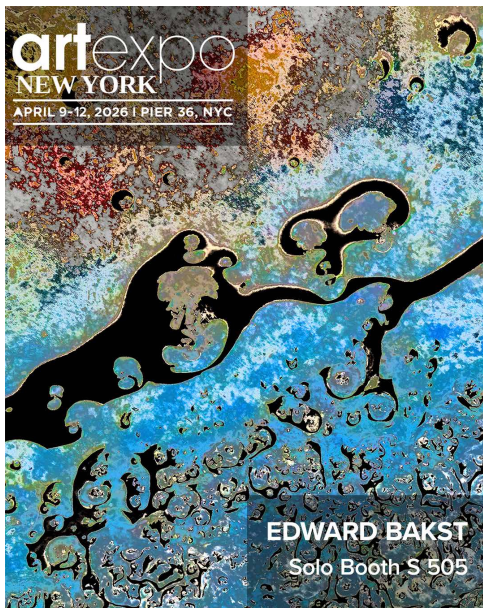

Moments Between the Movements

Dancers training and on stage in Bali, Bangkok, and Siem Reap

My introduction to dance performances in Southeast Asia did not begin in a theater, but in a rehearsal studio. In Siem Reap, Cambodia, dancers practiced precise hand gestures and eye movements, repeating sequences with quiet focus. Similar moments unfolded in performance spaces in Bangkok, Thailand and Bali, Indonesia, where centuries-old traditions continue to shape contemporary cultural life.

The tradition of Khmer Classical Dance in Cambodia traces its origins to the royal courts of the Khmer Empire and the sacred imagery carved into the temples of Angkor Wat near Siem Reap. The dance is characterized by slow, fluid gestures and highly stylized hand movements that symbolize elements of nature, mythology, and spiritual narratives. Khon, one of Thailand's most celebrated classical dance traditions, combines stylized dance, elaborate costumes, and ornate masks representing mythological characters; each movement and gesture follows a carefully codified vocabulary that conveys narrative and emotion. Traditional Balinese Dance is known for its expressive gestures, intricate hand movements, and striking eye expressions; rooted in Hindu ritual and temple ceremonies, many Balinese dances tell stories from ancient epics.

As a photographer, I was drawn to the moments during the practices and the performances—the preparation, the stillness, and the discipline behind each movement. Dancers moved through traditions shaped over generations, each gesture carrying meaning beyond the moment. What stayed with me most were the quiet intervals—the concentration, the adjustment of sophisticated costumes, the pause before stepping onto the stage. These images are small glimpses of those moments, where discipline, artistry, and cultural memory come together through movement.

“Towards a More Perfect Union” WPS Special Showcase

Our standard Showcases generally have a few members displaying many images. This special Showcase is an opportunity for many members to share a few images each and talk about their captures, thoughts and experiences associated with these photographs.

“America 250 – Towards a More Perfect Union” is the title of this special Showcase.

As you are aware, our country will be celebrating a BIG birthday this year. The Semiquincentennial will mark the two-and-a-half centuries since the signing of the Declaration of Independence. We can anticipate a ramping up of excitement as the celebration day, July 4th, 2026, approaches.”



While the nation's 250th birthday is the impetus for this Showcase and celebrations on and around July 4th may be the central theme of many images, we are inviting members to submit images that he/she feels are representative of Americana. Images could have been taken at any time, not just in the 2026 year. This is an opportunity for the club to come together and share their own take on the American experience.

On the national level there will be a host of commemorative memorializing activities. As expected, the BIG parade and celebratory programs will take place in Washington, DC. But parades and other forms of celebrations are being planned from big cities to small towns.

I would anticipate that many local municipalities will celebrate this date with their own patriotic events. Maybe, we can create a forum where people can share information about events. We can work to orchestrate some fieldtrips to some of the more interesting and/or accessible events.

While birthdays are generally considered a time for celebration, our Sestercentennial occurs at a time when politics complicates the landscape. Therefore, intertwined with the festive celebrations may be forms of protest or other displays encouraging citizens to reflect not just on the benefit and pride of being an American but also what it means to be an American.

So, get out there. Attend events of your choice and be on the lookout for displays of patriotism or protest. Take pictures of others or a selfie showing your participation and/or personal position. Be observant for bold and splashy displays or more intimate expressions made by your fellow Americans.

To clarify, we are looking for any image(s) that tells something about the experience of being an American or living in America. The general format will be like a standard Showcase with images being submitted through Photo Contest Pro. The scheduling of this Showcase will be determined by the Program Director.

Individuals will be invited to share their images and discuss circumstances of when and where they took the photograph and what the experience of the moment might have been. This will be storytelling at its best. We can have a lot of fun sharing experiences of memorable moments.

The caveat to this America 250 Showcase will be that all members will be requested and required to strive towards keeping the sharing experience politically neutral. While the country may be divided, let WPS be united in the congenial sharing of our images and experiences.

We will all look forward to your submissions and narrative descriptions of your Americana captures.

IMPORTANT MESSAGE

Dear WPS Member.

In accordance with WPS governing rules, the Board of Directors invites you to participate in an important Annual Membership vote to ratify our amended Bylaws approved by the Board on March 19, 2026. Your presence and engagement are crucial to achieving the required quorum and voting to accept our governing documents, ensuring that we continue to serve the best interests of the club and our valued members.

The current WPS Bylaws, originally adopted almost fifty years ago, have undergone only few revisions to date. However, over that same period, the club has continued to evolve in response to changing times and the needs of its members, which impacted on the way the club operates today. As a result, certain provisions in the existing Bylaws are outdated or no longer reflect current practices.

To address this, WPS has prepared and approved a revised set of Bylaws that more accurately reflects the club's current structure, its operations and ongoing mission.

To help members review the Bylaws, we prepared a document titled [“WPS BYLAWS-Track changes – Final”](#) showing the current Bylaws with all the deletions and additions that were implemented and an updated document that incorporates all the changes made titled [“WPS BYLAWS – Final”](#)

The proposed amendments can be summarized as follows

1. **Greater flexibility:** Making provisions more general to allow the Board to make procedural adjustments more efficiently. This includes removing references to meetings being held on a specific day of the week or at a specific location or at fix location (such as on Fridays or Westchester Community College).
2. **Consistency in timeframes:** Aligning and standardizing various time-related requirements such as membership duration for candidates to be eligible for Board service, and the advance notice period requirement for calling a Special Membership Meetings to be the same as for the Annual Membership Meeting.
3. **Structural updates:** Removing outdated membership classifications and Board positions and clarifying that all officers must be members of the Board.
4. **Clarity and accuracy:** Eliminating redundant or inconsistent provisions and correcting typographical and drafting errors.

Please mark your calendar and plan to attend the Annual Membership meeting. Your active commitment is vital to ensure that our club remains responsive and effective for all club members.

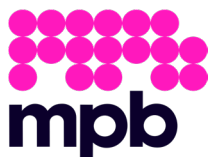
