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COMING UP

Harvey Stein on March 15 **Ways of Seeing**

Harvey Stein will share aspects of his photography career that spans over 50 years of consistent and impressive work in photography. He will show and discuss work from his newest book, "Coney Island People 50 Years," and two previous books including "Mexico Between Life and Death," as well as a new book in the making. He will discuss how to maintain a creative drive and edge over such a long span of time. Mr. Stein is well known for his strong, close-up and involving street photography as well as his sensitive portraiture of people from around the world. For him, photography is a way to learn about life, living and self. "Mostly I do long-term projects that are of personal interest. I photograph situations, people and places I don't know and need to learn about. Photography is the most meaningful thing I could ever do. It is my way of saying, 'I am here' and my way of sharing some of my life and understanding of the world with others".

Bio

HARVEY STEIN is a professional photographer, teacher, lecturer, author and curator based in New York City; he is a long-time faculty member at The International Center of Photography and also teaches at the Los Angeles Center of Photography. He has conducted travel photo workshops to Europe, Mexico, South America, Vietnam, India, and China for more than two decades. He has had 91 solo exhibitions, has participated in over 170 group shows and has work in 60 permanent collections. Stein's tenth and most recent book, "Coney Island People 50 Years," was published in 2022. He was the Director of Photography at Umbrella Arts, a gallery in the East Village (2009-2019). He has curated 67 exhibits since 2007. Stein's photography is represented by Sous Les Etoiles Gallery in New York City. 

Calling All Members

WPS is a photography club that depends on the support and participation of its members.

Going forward, we will be shifting our program format in order to incorporate more member participation programs. If you have a field of expertise that you would like to share, and educate your fellow members, let us know about your talents. Since we are a photography club, maybe you would prefer to present an individual slide show presentation. We intend to ask and encourage members to volunteer to do a presentation to the club at large. This is a way of sharing with one another. It is an opportunity for other members to get to know you and your work and it is a mechanism for you to give back to the club that gives to you.

We appreciate that not all members feel they have a body of work they would readily show to others. But, we are a friendly and supportive group that is both eager to see your work, and will be happy to support you in your endeavor. After all, each journey starts with a first step. We also know that many may not be well versed in assembling a slide show and would find that part of the process vexing and intimidating.

So, let us help you help us. All you need is a group of 10-30 images, more if you like, on any topic or subject matter. Then a fellow club member will help mentor you. They can assist and guide you with assembling the show on your own. Or you can assemble your images in the same basic format used for submitting to our competitions, and forward them to that mentor. You and the mentor will work out the specifics. The mentor will take your images, assemble them in the Lightroom slide show module (or PowerPoint) and facilitate displaying your images at one of our regular meetings. You will be in charge and provide narration to your images.

This can be a fun and enjoyable learning experience. It will help you learn the skill of making a slide show and sharing your work with others. You could choose to show any type of images, on any topic. To help you along, here are a number of topic ideas.

- Photographic a family heirloom, or other personal item, and tell us about it.
- Show us some travel pictures (new or old, near or far).
- Photograph something in your home, neighborhood, etc. and tell us about it.
- Self-assignment night: Pick a subject/topic that is different from what you normally photograph and go shoot a series:
 - Shoot like a pro. Get a photography book from the library on a photographer you like, have heard about, or what to know more about. Then work to imitate that photographer's style. Show us your results and tell us what you learned.
 - Photograph your pet, child/grandchild, significant other, relative, friend, passerby or even yourself. Create a series and share.
 - Self-assignments are the backbone of any skill development. You can pick any type of object, subject matter, location, topic or idea, and work to create images that are related to this topic.
 - Some of you may choose to go out with the specific intention of shooting with only a point-andshoot or cell phone camera, or you can walk out the door with a single lens on your camera and photograph only wide-angle, telephoto, or macro. You get the idea. You determine the project you would like to do. It's a learning experience. Go out, take some pictures and show us what you got. Tell us about the experience and what you might have learned.

Your efforts will benefit us all.









That's right! The new WPS website is coming soon!

We'd like to give you some basic information as to what the changeover will be like.

- 1. Our current website will be going off-line for a short time (maybe 1-3 weeks). You will see the above screen if you try to go to the WPS site.
- 2. You will probably get numerous messages telling you various things about your accounts. PAY NO ATTENTION TO THEM. They are all part of the changeover.
- 3. When the new site is ready, you will see the HOME PAGE when you open the site (the "Coming Soon" screen will no longer appear).
- You will not be able to log into the new site. Your accounts have been transferred, but your passwords won't work. You'll have to click on <u>Forgot password?</u> (Fig. A below)
- 5. You'll be sent a RESET PASSWORD link by email. (Fig. B)
- 6. Enter your email and a new password. (Fig. C). You'll be taken to the login page to log on with your new password.
