Abstract Photography: A Personal Journey

Topic

What is abstract photography? Just an out-of focus-image—hardly! Abstract photography can take on so many different forms it's hard to pin down an exact definition. That is what makes it so fascinating. In this presentation I will cover and discuss the many forms of abstract photography and the techniques used to create them. Simplicity, composition, angle of view, lighting, harmony and most importantly mystery. I discuss how to create effective abstract images using everyday objects, using design elements, using macro lenses, shooting through objects, capturing motion, playing with lighting and setting up a home studio to create and capture abstract images.

Bio

Photography has been part of me from a young age. It provided for emotive displays that were not commonplace in our home. The camera became an outlet for expressing feelings and artistic expression. Early on I joined the Baltimore Camera Club, where I found companionship with fellow photographers and have been honored with many competitive awards. Teaching photography is another essential component of my photography life, as I love sharing my passion. I currently teach for the Johns Hopkins Odyssey program, for the Smithsonian Associates program and for private students as well. I live for those aha moments that only teaching can provide.

Ally is a professional photographer and educator, as well as a Click Pro Elite and Lensbaby enthusiast. She is known for her inventive use of creative blur, color, and flare. Drawing on her strong background in marketing, Ally fuses her expertise in visual storytelling with her passion for daring artistry, inspiring others to discover the extraordinary in the everyday.



One Photographer's Journey Around Cape Cod

Topic

A compilation of my 15 years on Cape Cod in roughly geographic order, covering the 60 miles from the Canal to Provincetown, showing the rich diversity of environment and activity.

Bio

I have been an avid photographer and processor, on and off, since my teen years. B/W with wet chemistry and analogue processes through the 1980's. Fell in love with Olympus and the OM1. Then 30 years of travel and family snapshots until embracing digital in 2007 after moving to Cape Cod. Joined Cape Cod Viewfinders CC and never looked back. Monthly competitions were a huge stimulus and humbling learning experience. I estimate that I've submitted some 400 images over the 15 years on the Cape, achieving a shoebox of ribbons and one NECC IOY award. Still an enthusiastic Olympus micro 4/3s adherent, now using the EM1 Mark III.







TECH SUPPORT

How to Export Raw Photos from iPhone to Mac

- CHOSE RAW FILE WHEN DOWNLOADED TO MAC
- CLICK ON RAW PIX IN LIBRARY
- PHOTO TAB (AT TOP OF SCREEN)>FILE
- EXPORT > UNMODIFIED ORIGINAL BY HITTING EXPORT
- EXPORT AS ORIGINAL (KEEPS DNG FORMAT)

You can export one or more images this way. You can go back and export the image via the cloud for a JPEG so you have both versions. My workflow is to export them to a folder in FINDER.

Member in Focus: Mark Greenberg

Here's a brief introduction to Mark Greenberg, a new member who joined WPS in August 2024.

[inFocus] When and how did you first get involved in photography?

[Mark Greenberg] I first became interested in photography at the age of 6 when my parents bought me a Macy's box camera. My first attempt at a photograph was of a showcase of steaks in a butcher shop. My parents stopped me from taking the photo, telling me that the camera was for taking pictures of the family. I didn't take that picture but I never stopped using a camera. I began developing film and making contact



prints when I was nine or ten. I am including my first print of my mom. Circa 1955 or so. When I got to Junior High School, photography became my main hobby. I got a Pentacon F SLR and an enlarger and with my friend Joe Kase, and started a little business taking photos of the children in the classes of our mothers. Both our mothers were teachers. At that time, I went to the Guggenheim Museum and took photos of their very first show. Today, those prints are in the Guggenheim archive collection. In high school I was in the photography club and in college I took a course in photography. I studied art history as both an undergraduate and as a postgraduate student at Penn State. At that time, I received a work-study fellowship to George Eastman House and studied curatorship with Nathan Lyons. I also met and had a class on the history of photography with Beaumont Newhall. After that, when I returned to Penn State, I was befriended by Hank Wessel, with whom I studied. After a bad love affair, I returned to New York and did not complete my degree. I continued to photograph and was in many group shows at that time. In the mid-Seventies, I went to the ICP for lectures and studied with two of the lecturers I heard—Ruth Orkin, who became a friend, and Philippe Halsman, who liked my work but wouldn't have known me if he saw me on the street. He was not in good health at that time. I attach photos of both my teachers. I did one book of photographs, "Rochester, 1968," which MoMA liked enough to include in their library, so I am on register with MoMA. I attach the cover photo from that book and also the cover photo from a book of short stories I self-published. I write fiction, mainly involving photography, since I know it so well.

The above sort of tells how I got interested and more interested and still more interested in photography. Since the world has become digital, I am considerably less interested in photography. It is too expensive to use film, and digital photography and Photoshop have turned photography away from humanism, so I shoot less and, sadly, only in digital.

[iF] What is your profession?

[MG] I am now retired but never earned a living as a photographer. I worked first for New York State and then for the Social Security Administration reviewing disability claims for forty years.

[iF] What type of photography do you enjoy?

[MG] Mainly I enjoy taking pictures of people. I do a lot of street photography and portraits.

[iF] Do you do photo projects, and if so please describe a recent or favorite one.

[MG] I have three long-term projects associated with what I facetiously call Greenberg Studios: Beautiful women, children and dogs, our specialty. I also have a project of photographing classical guitarists as I am one myself. Not a very good one.

[iF] What inspires you?

[MG] Beautiful women, children and dogs inspire me. Also many of my favorite photographers. And great classical guitarists who play beautifully and give me a front-row seat to watch.

[iF] What do you hope to get out of your membership in WPS?

[MG] Mainly, keeping my friend Leon company. I hate photo contests and would never enter one. I would listen to a lecture and enjoyed the one about seeing. I might go on a field trip to a nice place.

[iF] Do you have any favorite photographers?

[MG] I have dozens of favorite photographers and own original prints by many of them. Alfred Stieglitz is my all-time favorite, and in my youth I wanted to be Stieglitz Jr. I hated Garry Winogrand's work when I first saw it but now I love it. I love Robert Frank and am sorry I never met him. Same with Cartier-Bresson. I did meet Elliot Erwitt and got him a buffet plate at the Museum of the City of

New York, and I love his work with dogs, especially for his wonderful sense of humor. Ruth Orkin was my friend and I love her work. She gave me an original print of "Girl in Italy" in exchange for about a dozen of my prints. I could go on and on. My son is named after Harry Callahan and Aaron Siskind, both of whom I met. I have prints by both and love their work, of course. I could go on but that's enough.

[iF] What gear and tools do you use? (Cameras/lenses, photoshop, etc.)

[MG] When I shot with film and used rangefinder cameras, I first used a Contax ii1 and then a series of Leicas, culminating in a Leica M2 and a Leica CL. As for SLRs, my first good camera was a Pentacon F with a magnificent Biotar lens. Sorry I ever got rid of it, but switched to a 1968 black Nikon F for portraits. I've been using digital since its beginning and have spent far too much money on a series of improving but still lousy cameras. These days, I use a Sony RX100 version 7 for street shooting and a Nikon D750 for portraits. I can't afford a digital Leica, nor a top-of-the-line fullframe Nikon. I dislike Photoshop but don't tell Leon. It's design, not photography, and has led to a lot of excess in color photography. I don't know how to use it and don't want to learn. I do use very basic exposure adjustment and cropping. Especially when I shoot with an iPhone 14 as a last resort. It has far too wide of a field of vision for serious work.

[iF] Tell me something about you unrelated to photography.

[MG] I've been married for 41 years to Donna Ann, my wife, and have a son, Aaron Harry, age 39, who is a registered nurse. He also likes photography and I will leave him my gear. I play classical guitar, none too well, and write fiction, but my work frequently focuses on photography, pardon the pun. I just self-published a book on Kindle, "Freed at Last," about the non-existent photographer, Max Freed. No relationship to the pitcher for Atlanta, I think. I was writing these stories before he was born. Saul Bellow liked the two of them he read, and published one.

[iF] What's one piece of advice you would give our readers (photographic or otherwise)?

[MG] The one piece of advice I would give photographers and anyone else is this: It all happens in the mind. It is a waste of time to worry about equipment, Photoshop, or anything else. Seeing is primary. Proof of this is that when Walker Evans gave Ben Shahn a Leica and a minimal amount of instruction in how to use it. Shahn went right out and took brilliant photos, a lot like his paintings. By the way, those are two more photographers I love. Own FSA prints by both of them.
